






Fathers do something.




What is a father?

- (n) The man who fertilized an ovum from which a child was born
- (n) A priest
- (v) Cause of a pregnancy resulting in the birth of a child
- (n): A man in relation to his child,
- Father is defined broadly as the male or males identified as most involved in caregiving and committed to the well being of the child, regardless of living situation, marital status or biological relation


Mythical Roles: Fatherhood and Masculinity

- The Essential Father hypothesis
- Fatherhood need not be identified with masculinity



Many studies have demonstrated that children's well-being is affected much more by their relationships with their parents, their parents' sense of competence and security, and the presence of social and economic support for the family than by the gender or the sexual orientation of their parents.




Involved Fathers are Good for Everyone

Fathers should father early, often and well





Early Father Involvement is important



Data shows that getting fathers involved early in their children's lives predicts later involvement



Prenatal involvement and living with the mother is the strongest predictor of their involvement by the time a child is aged 5 years



Simple experiences such as bathing demonstrations and skin to skin time in the first 24 hours leads to greater paternal involvement



More time spent at home with a child after birth 2 weeks or more are more likely to be involved in diapering feeding, cleaning at 9 months



Fathers are Good for Infants



• INVOLVED FATHERS

- Boost, motor, communication and problem-solving outcomes
- Decreased mental health symptomatology in children 9 years of age
- Mediated through direct effects and even more profoundly through effects on maternal health, wellness and bonding

DISENGAGED FATHERS

Resulted in behavioral concerns in children as early as age 1

Fathers are Good for School Age Children: Language

- More words and language to the child yield greater benefit to child
- At 3 years of age, father-child communication was a unique predictor of advanced language development
- Moms cater language to known vocabulary.
 Fathers are more likely to introduce new words expanding language capability

Fathers are good for School Age Children: Risk taking and problem solving "Adventure!"

- Encourage rough and tumble, rules change, high energy activities
- Help kids stay focused when amped up and the introduction of novel enterprise
- Father involvement in play with preschoolers predicted decreased externalizing and internalizing behavior

Fathers are good for Adolescents

- Longitudinal Studies and recent meta-analysis have shown father involvement showed less risk behavior and depressive symptoms
- Benefits- reduced behavioral problems and enhanced cognitive development, reduced psychosocial problems in adolescent girls









- ACKNOWLEDGE FATHERS and create spaces that welcome them
- ENGAGE fathers DURING the PRENATAL period
- ENCOURAGE the development of a healthy CO-PARENTING dynamic
- Seek ways to better ENGAGE fathers, especially BIPOC AND LOW-INCOME FATHERS
- Be prepared to CONNECT MEN WITH RESOURCES and services that may fall outside your scope, and make sure they're supported in their journey
- Create FATHER SPECIFIC PROGRAMMING

Guidelines for Practice: The Basics



- Welcome fathers and express appreciation for attending a clinic visit; actively engage fathers beginning with prenatal visit.
- Introduce yourself to both parents during a clinical visit and politely explore the father's relationship to the mother to assess type of relationship and the personal beliefs of the father
- Emphasize to fathers they are role models for their children and therefore encourage them to model positive behavior such as using seat belts in cars and helmets with bikes and limiting behavior such as alcohol, tobacco and other substance use.
- Educate fathers about how to support mothers who are breastfeeding.
- Encourage the early participation of fathers in the care of children particularly alone time with children to build father's confidence and develop his own style of interaction. Talk to fathers about skills they may find lacking



- Inform and discuss with parents the normal responses that fathers will have in becoming a father, including elation, fatigue and challenges including those to intimacy and the sexual relationship.
- Discuss how the parents are adapting to parenthood after each child; encourage them to continue to engage in activities without the children.



Guidelines for Practice: Advanced Conversations

- Recognize possible differences in parenting style between the mother and father
 - Serve as mediator without siding with either parent to discuss differences
- Discuss family composition
 - Cultural beliefs about fathering
 - Role of men in families
 - Division of childcare tasks within the family
 - Physical health of each parent (update vaccines and encourage health)
- Ascertain when it might be important to include both parents when needing permission for performing a medical procedure on a child.
 - Try to include fathers in written communications about the child, such as test results



Guidelines for Practice: Systemic and Procedural Steps



REVIEW vaccines for both parents to keep them up-todate on vaccines such as flu and pertussis



SCREEN fathers for perinatal depression



IDENTIFY current and necessary future public policies that support fathers' involvement with their children, such as promoting the FMLA and flexible work schedule (HF1278)



TABLE 5 Recommendations for Father-Inclusive Perinatal Parent Education Programs

- 1. Father-inclusive perinatal parent education programs should employ a family systems approach by involving both the father and mother⁸⁰
- 2. When possible, programs should employ men or male-female teams as facilitators^{47,48}
- 3. Consider employing facilitators that mirror the characteristics (eg, ethnicity or race, age, culture, language) of the fathers being served^{61,82}
- 4. Train facilitators to welcome, engage, and directly speak with fathers^{6,15,63}
- 5. Include father-only group sessions to provide a safe space for men to express their feelings, combat social isolation, and receive peer support^{38,60}
- 6. Use a strengths-based perspective by focusing and building on the positive characteristics fathers bring to parenting^{60,63,64}
- 7. Implement programs that are tailored to fathers' parenting needs (for example, programs that are sensitive to the needs of nonresidential fathers)
- Consider whether aspects of the clinical environment are welcoming and friendly to fathers (eg, pictures of men with infants, magazines for fathers and mothers in the waiting room)⁶⁵
- 9. Include in the curriculum content related to improving the coparenting relationship between the father and mother^{15,60}
- 10. Allow room for fathers and mothers to discuss topics that are most relevant to their parenting circumstances and needs⁶⁰
- 11. Develop special events that celebrate fathers and fatherhood⁶⁴
- Provide literature, such as brochures, to fathers that contain educational content related to infant care and development, stress management, and community-based resources⁸⁴
- 13. Educate mothers about the importance of father involvement on child development and well-being⁶
- 14. Consider providing child care, financial incentives, meals, and/or transportation^{60,65}
- 15. Deliver programs during times (eg, evenings or weekends) when it is convenient for fathers to participate^{82,64}
- Offer parent education along with other services, such as employment assistance, General Education Development test preparation, and support to address mental health and substance abuse problems^{65,66}
- When welcomed, use mobile technology, such as text messages, as reminders for program sessions, check-ins, and follow-ups (especially after a father misses a session)⁶⁰
